The aim of Project Utthaan is to improve health and education among children, adolescents and women. Project Utthaan is using a community-based approach to address the problems of poor access and awareness on Reproductive, Maternal, Newborn, Child and Adolescent Health (RMNCHA), education support services for primary school children and literacy programmes for women.

The project is being implemented in 12 villages in the Matanhail Block, Jhajjar Haryana include Jharli, Jhamri, Khanpur Kurd, Khanpur Kalan, Bajitpur, Dhalanwas, Sehlanga, Sasroli, Sunderheti, Ladayan, Aakheri Madanpur and Amadal Sahpur. These villages have around 36,000 people with 15,546 women and 4,252 children in the 0-6 age group. The project started in July 2022 and will carry on till March 2025.

The project activities include:

- Supporting maternal and child health and education services through 40 Anganwadi Centres. These services include improvement of essential infrastructure of 5 Anganwadi Centres.
- Strengthening the capacities of 100 frontline workers including Government Community Health Workers (CHWs), Auxiliary Nursing Midwives (ANMs), Accredited Social Health Activists (ASHAs) and Anganwadi Workers.
- Promoting awareness among 500 adolescent girls about health, hygiene, nutrition, Adolescent Reproductive and Sexual Health among others through clubs.
- Increasing the learning levels of 1,100 government primary school students through the Kadam+ programme.
- Providing functional literacy trainings to 1,000 illiterate women through proven Computer Based Functional Literacy technology.



Utthaan project's team is working in coordination with the Department of Women and Child Development, Department of Health, Integrated Child Development Services (ICDS), Department of Education, District Education Officer and Block Education Officer, Education For All (EFA), Child Development Project Officer (CDPO), Supervisors, Anganwadi Staff, Panchayati Raj Institution (PRI) members, primary health centres and sub-centres.

The project is being supported by Jhajjar Power Limited (an Apraava Energy Company) and implemented by Humana People to People India.



Humana People to People India (HPPI) is a development organisation registered as a not-for-profit company under section 25 of the Companies Act, 1956 as of 21st May 1998. It is a non-political, non-religious organisation working for the holistic development of the underprivileged and marginalised people in the rural and urban areas.
